



HAVE YOUR SAY ON THE RIGHT TO WORK FROM HOME

As part of its plan to enshrine the right to work from home in law, the Allan Labor Government is encouraging Victorians to have their say at engage.vic.gov.au/wfh. Premier Jacinta Allan and Minister for Industrial Relations Jaclyn Symes today opened consultation to all Victorians ahead of legislation being introduced to the Parliament next year.

The consultation brings together workers and employers alike to ensure the proposed laws reflect the real-world experience of working from home: what's fair, what's practical, and what's already working. Under the proposed laws, if you can reasonably do your job from home, you will have the right to do so for at least two days a week, whether you work in the public sector or private sector. Consultation won't determine whether working from home should be a right – we already know it should be. This is about making sure the rules are appropriate. As part of the consultation, the Government will consider the types of businesses and the size of businesses that will be covered by the proposed law, as well as the definition of remote work, and who is able to do it. The Government is launching two consultation streams: • Opening today is an online survey through Engage Victoria. Any employee or employer can participate in this survey. To have your say, visit engage.vic.gov.au/wfh. • Roundtable discussions with industry will also be held from September 2025. Stakeholders, peak bodies and unions can register their interest for the roundtable consultations at engage.vic.gov.au/wfh. Survey data will reveal what Victorians think about working from home – including whether employees have ever been denied a request to work from home, and whether they still feel unable to ask for it in their workforce. Working from home works for families and it's good for the economy. It's popular. Flexible working arrangements are utilised by workers and businesses alike, with more than a third of Australian workers – including 60 per cent of professionals – regularly working from home. It saves families money. It saves Australians on average \$110 a week or \$5,308 every year. That's more money back in the pockets of hardworking Victorians at a time when every dollar makes a difference. Working from home gets more people working. It supports women with children, carers and people with a disability to work – and it's better for business with workforce participation 4.4 per cent higher than before the pandemic. It cuts congestion. Victorians are now spending less time commuting, saving more than three hours in their week on average. That's three fewer hours sitting in traffic and three more hours back in your life.


We have started! Cockatoo community needlework project

Aiden talked about the new initiative, Crime Stoppers is running at the moment.

LEVEL UP AGAINST CAR THEFT

I was not aware that with new technology a thief does not even need to enter your home to be able to steal your car. Your keyless system radiates a pulse and technology has developed a system that picks up on this pulse. How do you beat that????

Ways to stop this access is by using a Faraday Bag, which stops the pulse being picked up . These are fairly inexpensive. You can have a kill switch - immobiliser, put on your car that stops thieves being able to start your car. There is a garage type remote that you switch as you leave the car and to start car you re hit the switch. Use an old fashioned steering wheel lock. All these items can protect your car and most thieves will not want to spend too much time trying to break in. So good detergents. Put sensor lights around your home or garage as this deters thieves.

Remember most crimes need an opportunity, means to get what they want and a motive. Whilst you can't stop the motive (need) you can remove the means, leaving your house or garage door open, and having the opportunity by leaving your items on open display. Peace... silence? Calmness? No anxiety, frustration or stress? How can we experience peace

when we live in a noisy, fast paced busy world?

Well, we usually can do something about noise. Turn off the devices that produce noise.

But some of those other things are an internal response and can't be turned off with a switch or button or at will.



However, we can do something to soothe our inner anxieties or frustrations. That something is taking up a craft or activity of some kind.

One of our members recently had an experience out of her control.

She panicked when she realized her mobile wasn't working. She couldn't ring out. Her situation is difficult - some physical issues keep her mostly housebound, and no one checks on her regularly to see if she is ok. Hence her dependence on her mobile. Telstra (she was able to go to a Telstra shop - it was a Telstra problem, so they said) assured her the mobile would be working after an hour or two, but it wasn't. This is when her panic increased, and all sorts of negative thoughts shouted at her. 'It's all my fault! What if... happens? No one knows if I'm in trouble. etc. I still can't contact anyone ...'

However, another thought popped into her head - 'I'll do some spinning'. So, she sat down at her spinning wheel and started to spin - and that did the trick! After some time, she felt calm and realized that she was ok and would continue to be ok. She went to bed - phone still not working - but she slept and in the morning the mobile was operative!

The dictionary states that therapy is a treatment that helps someone feel better, grow stronger, etc. especially after an illness. We don't have to be ill though to benefit from something therapeutic. We can be stressed, frustrated, angry, frightened, ...

It was the time she spent spinning that enabled our member to take her mind off the mobile. Doing something she enjoyed calmed her mind, engaged her creativity and helped her to feel better.



To coincide with September's, Save the Koala Month, the <u>Australian Koala</u>

<u>Foundation</u> and <u>Wild Dog Books</u> announce the release, on 26 August, of *One Koala*<u>One Hundred Trees</u>, a picture book by debut author Leesa Allinson and awardwinning illustration team Heather Potter and Mark Jackson.

One Koala, One Hundred Trees is a heart-warming story about one family's determination to create a safer environment for the Koalas living on their land. The story is interspersed with Koala facts and practical tips for readers wanting to build their own 'Koala corridor' to help protect one of Australia's most precious animals. Proceeds from the book will directly support the Australian Koala Foundation's Koak Kiss Project.

The picture book can be pre-ordered now at any bookstore. On release, it will be available across Australia in bookstores, selected gift shops, and on the Australian Koala Foundation's <u>Save The Koala Online shop</u>. A portion of each sale will go towards the Australian Koala Foundation's Koala Kiss Project.

The Koala Kiss Project aims to build an uninterrupted Koala conservation corridor from southern Victoria all the way to north Queensland by linking intact sections of Koala habitat separated by cleared land, called 'Kiss Points'.

Heather Potter and Mark Jackson are illustrators and frequent collaborators whose works have been featured in several exhibitions. They are the recipients of many awards, notably the CBCA Book of the Year Award and the Wilderness Society Environment Award for Children's Literature.

Gembrook has always been associated with Potatoes.

In 1877, the Backhouse Brothers were digging 5 tons of Potatoes to the acre. This was only 4 years after Settlement began in 1873. (Casey-Cardinia –links to our past: The year of the potato)

Once Puffing Billy came to Gembrook, it made transportation of potatoes a lot easier. Despite the claims by those engaged in the Timber industry, potatoes played a part in the opening of the railway.

By 1922, no less than 200 acres of potatoes were being planted annually in Gembrook. The newly cleared land had left volcanic soil of great fertility.

In an article in The Australian, September 9th 1922, it states, "The quality of the Gembrook Potatoes cannot be excelled, and there is always a keen demand for them at top quotations. One of the local farmers forwarded a truck to Melbourne early in August, and received the following memorandum, from the selling Agent-" The potatoes are equal to any arriving in Melbourne. Today we made as high as £7/10 a ton, which price being, we believe higher than was realized for potatoes from any other district".

The main growers at this time were Messers- Byrcholl Bros., V.Carter, J. Deeble, J. Turnbull, J. Hamilton, J.Jones, J. Kelly, M.D Night, J. Monsergh, F. Onley, J.Quigley, E. Riepel, J.Tate, J.Twyford ans son, J. Ure Senior and J. Ure Junior.

The varieties being grown were, Carman No1, Manistee, Clark's main crop, Snowflake and Up to date.

The late 20's and early 30's saw Koo Wee Rup hit by floods. In 1934 they were hit hard. 11000- 12000 acres of potato crops were lost. This equated to 40000 to 50000 tons of Spuds. It was after the 1934 floods that Potato farming in Gembrook took off. Farmers were sick of dealing with floods and were attracting by the fertile soil, slopped paddocks and less chance of flooding, headed to the Hills.

It was at this time, and into the early 40's that many Italians came into the area. They were referred to as "Enemy Aliens".

In 1942, it was reported in The Healesville and Yarra Glen Guardian that in the Emerald district, which extended from Menzies Creek to Gembrook and included Monbulk, Cockatoo, Clematis and Macclesfield, that 122 Enemy Aliens, except for a dozen Albanians were Italian. 39 of the Enemy Aliens were growing potatoes. Those that were Naturalized were able to purchase lands, while others leased land to grow Potatoes. There was a lot of resentment towards the Italians during the war. Many Australians struggled watching the Italians becoming successful Potato Growers, while many of the locals were overseas fighting in the War.

Others respected the Italians work ethic and admired their wives that worked alongside their husbands in the paddock. Some of the Italians growing potatoes in that time were Savarino, Gallenti, Angelo and Phillip Falcone, Giuseppe Lamendola, Croce (Roger) Pantorno, Vincenzo Failla, Guiseppe Raciti, Filippo Pepi, Giuseppe Pavone, G. licciardi, Gaetano D'Angelo and Vincenzo Scacco.

Dry conditions in the early 50's led to very hard times for the local farmers. Grub decimated many crops. Victoria had a potato shortage. It was referred to as the `Victorian Potato Famine'. Some weeks the Melbourne Markets didn't have any potatoes delivered. Hospitals were considering serving the patients dehydrated potatoes. The issue wasn't that there wasn't any potatoes, it was that growers could get more money sending what potatoes they had to Sydney, or to sell them on the Black Market.

In 1954, Red Gem Packers began operations in the Big Shed in the old Puffing Billy Yard, selling washed Potatoes.

1956, saw some areas in Victoria have a dry early part of the year and then other areas were hit by severe floods. This affected the quantity and quality of Potatoes. The price of potatoes sky rocketed. People in Sydney were offering Rugby Tickets for potatoes, bags of potatoes were being stolen off slow moving trucks and out of paddocks. The humble Potato had become a Rich man's Food.

This was the year that the Gembrook Potato farmer struck gold. One local farmer was so happy to finally be able to buy a new Suit. Two brothers who were growing together earned £42000 and could have purchased 21 houses.

In 1957, they couldn't give their spuds away.

Due to the money made in 1956, many farmers were able to update their equipment. They retired their horses and purchased tractors. Many farming techniques had to change. With the horses, the crops had to be planted across the paddocks. This made it easier for the horses to pull the implements. With Tractors, they had to plant up and down the paddocks. This made it easier to control the implements and reduced the risk of rolling tractors etc on the slopes.

The first dams began to be built. In the past the farmers had relied on Gembrook's adequate rainfall and Springs that ran close to the surface to water their crops. With the dams and new Sprinkler Systems they could control the watering. This was monumental in the control of Grub. Crop sizes began to increase.

In November 1961, Giuseppe Pavone took the Potato Producers Co-Operative to court. For many years the co-Operative had dictated the amount of potatoes that could be grown and dug and also set the prices paid. If you were a member of the Co-Operative you could only sell your Potatoes through them. There was some loop holes that allowed Interstate sales. Some families who farmed together were able to have some family members contracted to them and others not. But Sole farmers like Pavone did not have this freedom. Once contracted with the Co-Operative, it was for life.

There was no expiry date and no way to leave. Joe Pavone had had enough. He took them to court and won. This lead to expiry dates being added to contracts. This also gave the growers more freedom.

In the early 60's the local farmers volunteered their time and machinery to plant a crop of potatoes on the land owned by the sports ground to help finance the build of the current sports ground.

The 1970's and 1980's were the biggest years of growing Spuds in Gembrook. Approximately 40 000 tonnes of Potatoes came out of Gembrook in 1971. There were over 30 potato growing families in the area.

In the June of 1970, the Dandenong Ranges Farmers Federation was formed under Julian Dyer and he became an Agent, selling Gembrook Potatoes interstate.

Gembrook Engineering opened in 1971 and we saw the first Hilder harvester in 1974. The Granieri Brothers packing shed also opened in 1974.

In 1987, things were to seriously begin to change for the Gembrook Potato growers when Dieldrin was detected in the soil. Dieldrin had been used by the farmers since 1965 to combat Wire worm. It was used under the advice provided by The State department of Agriculture and Rural Affairs. This didn't affect growing Potatoes, it affected cattle. Cattle, was a secondary source of income for most growers.

Growing potatoes was to become more difficult in 1992 when PCN (Potato Cyst Nematodes) was detected in Gembrook. This resulted in Gembrook Potatoes being banned from Interstate markets. Prior to PCN being found, Gembrook sold more than 80% of its potatoes interstate for a premium price.

Farms could no longer support more than one generation. The younger generation, those under the age of 40 started to leave the farms to find other occupations. From 1984 to 1995, the amount of potatoes grown in Gembrook dropped by 48%. Many of the farmers still growing were heading towards Retirement. By 1995, there was only 12 families still farming in Gembrook.

Since 1995, the number of farmers and the amount of potatoes grown has continued to decline. Increased Government red tape, Supermarkets affecting price and broad acre farming has also had an impact on the Gembrook farmer and their decision to stay on the land.

In 2025, there were only 4 families still growing in Gembrook. They are Phil & Jess Falcone, John and Peter Granieri, Paul Volta and Paul and Tom Volta. In total, there was less than 100 acres of Potatoes planted this season.

Soon the potato growing industry of Gembrook will fade into history like the Gembrook timber industry before it.



Cardinia Shire Council is inviting the community to have their say on the draft 2025-2035 Asset Plan.

The draft Asset Plan outlines Council's strategic approach to managing over **\$2.7 bil- lion** in infrastructure assets including:

- 847km of sealed local roads
- 822km of unsealed local and rural roads
- More than 900km of footpath and shared use paths
- Over 295 bridges
- Over 300 community buildings including halls, libraries, child and family centres
- Over 1,000 km of stormwater pipes and 37,000 drainage pits
- More than 130 playgrounds
- More than 150 tennis and netball courts and over 40 sporting grounds

Cardinia Shire Council Mayor Councillor Jack Kowarzik is encouraging the community to have their say on the draft Asset Plan to help inform its direction and overall implementation over the next decade.

"Cardinia Shire is growing rapidly, and our infrastructure must grow with it. With our population expected to reach over 160,000 people by 2035, this Asset Plan outlines how we plan to manage our infrastructure to meet the needs of our community now and into the future."

"As a growth area, the shire faces the dual challenge of expanding infrastructure while renewing ageing assets. Balancing these priorities is complex, especially as Council often relies on developer contributions and external government support to fund new community infrastructure." Mayor Kowarzik said.

The draft Asset Plan has utilised technology and data to help prioritise maintenance, renewal, and upgrade scheduling, as well as identify the shire's infrastructure and funding gaps to help guide Council's future advocacy efforts.

"Aligning with the Council Plan 2025–2029, Community Vision 2040, and the long-term financial plan, the draft plan has been developed through a deliberative engagement process and has been shaped by initial feedback provided by community panel members and volunteers as part of the wider Council Plan consultation process.

Community consultation is now open and will close **on Tuesday 9 September 2025 at 5pm**. Council will then review the community feedback before finalising the plan for consideration at the October 2025 Council meeting.

"We want to hear from you to understand how we can better manage and upgrade our local infrastructure. Your feedback will help shape the work we do over the next decade, so this is your chance to have your say." Mayor Kowarzik said.
