
Yes, the fish and chip shop has new owners. We are local, very excited to be more involved in the town, and committed to providing everyone with tasty food!






Our Victorian Government is continuing to support accessible, affordable healthcare in local communities by making the successful Community Pharmacist Pilot a permanent Program from 1 July 2025.

Under the expanded program:

- Pharmacists will continue offering services to treat UTIs, skin conditions, the resupply of oral contraceptives, and the range of vaccines treatments first introduced through the pilot.
- Over the next two years, up to 22 health conditions and well-being services will be available through community pharmacies.
- Most consultations will remain free, to ensure services remain accessible.

Gembrook Spuds

Gembrook has always been associated with Potatoes. In 1877, the Blackhouse Brothers were digging 5 tons of Potatoes to the acre. This was only 4 years after Settlement began in 1873. (Casey-Cardinia –links to our past: The year of the potato) Once Puffing Billy came to Gembrook, it made transportation of potatoes a lot easier. Despite the claims by those engaged in the Timber industry, potatoes played a part in the opening of the railway.

By 1922, no less than 200 acres of potatoes were being planted annually in Gembrook. The newly cleared land had left volcanic soil of great fertility.

In an article in The Australian, September 9th 1922, it states, "The quality of the Gembrook Potatoes cannot be excelled, and there is always a keen demand for them at top quotations. One of the local farmers forwarded a truck to Melbourne early in August, and received the following memorandum, from the selling Agent-" The potatoes are equal to any arriving in Melbourne. Today we made as high as £7/10 a ton, which price being, we believe higher than was realised for potatoes from any other district".

The main growers at this time were Messers- Byrcholl Bros., V.Carter, J. Deeble, J. Turnbull, J. Hamilton, J.Jones, J. Kelly, M.D Night, J. Monsergh, F. Onley, J.Quigley, E. Riepel, J.Tate, J.Twyford ans son, J. Ure Senior and J. Ure Junior. The varieties being grown were, Carman No1, Manistee, Clark's main crop, Snowflake and Up to date.

The late 20's and early 30's saw Koo Wee Rup hit by floods. In 1934 they were hit hard. 11000- 12000 acres of potato crops were lost. This equated to 40000 to 50000 tons of Spuds. It was after the 1934 floods that Potato farming in Gembrook took off. Farmers were sick of dealing with floods and were attracting by the fertile soil, slopped paddocks and less chance of flooding, headed to the Hills.

It was at this time, and into the early 40's that many Italians came into the area. They were referred to as "Enemy Aliens".In 1942, it was reported in The Healesville and Yarra Glen Guardian that in the Emerald district, which extended from Menzies Creek to Gembrook and included Monbulk, Cockatoo, Clematis and Macclesfield, that 122 Enemy Aliens, except for a dozen Albanians were Italian. 39 of the Enemy Aliens were growing potatoes. Those that were Naturalised were able to purchase lands, while others leased land to grow Potatoes. There was a lot of resentment towards the Italians during the war. Many Australians struggled watching the Italians becoming successful Potato Growers, while many of the locals were overseas fighting in the War. Others respected the Italians work ethic and admired their wives that worked alongside their husbands in the paddock.

Some of the Italians growing potatoes in that time were Savarino, Gallenti, Angelo and Phillip Falcone, Giuseppe Lamendola, Croce (Roger) Pantorno, Vincenzo Failla, Guiseppe Raciti, Filippo Pepi, Giuseppe Pavone, G. licciardi and Vincenzo Scacco. (Continued next page)

Gembrook Spuds (continued)

Dry conditions in the early 50's led to very hard times for the local farmers. Grub decimated many crops. Victoria had a potato shortage. It was referred to as the `Victorian Potato Famine'. Some weeks the Melbourne Markets didn't have any potatoes delivered. Hospitals were considering serving the patients dehydrated potatoes. The issue wasn't that there wasn't any potatoes, it was that growers could get more money sending what potatoes they had to Sydney, or to sell them on the Black Market.

In 1954, Red Gem Packers began operations in the Goods Shed in the old Puffing Billy Yard, selling washed Potatoes.

1956, saw some areas in Victoria have a dry early part of the year and then other areas were hit by severe floods. This affected the quantity and quality of Potatoes. The price of potatoes sky rocketed. People in Sydney were offering Rugby Tickets for potatoes, bags of potatoes were being stolen off slow moving trucks and out of paddocks. The humble Potato had become a Rich man's Food.

This was the year that the Gembrook Potato farmer struck gold. One local farmer was so happy to finally be able to buy a new Suit. Two brothers who were growing together earned £42000 and purchased 21 houses.

In 1957, they couldn't give their spuds away.

Due to the money made in 1956, many farmers were able to update their equipment. They retired their horses and purchased tractors. Many farming techniques had to change. With the horses, the crops had to be planted across the paddocks. This made it easier for the horses to pull the implements. With Tractors, they had to plant up and down the paddocks. This made it easier to control the implements and reduced the risk of rolling tractors etc on the slopes. (Tina commented "I don't feel right taking all the credit. Julian Dyer and my dad Joe Pantorno helped greatly and Michelle Granieri provided many of the photos.)





3 things you can do to keep your kids safe

1. Prepare them to travel independently in your neighbourhood

It's important to make sure your child is ready to walk to school, their friend's house or around your neighbourhood without you.

We have developed a fun and interactive e-learning journey, called <u>Safer in the Community</u> that you and your child can do together. Start today at Neighbourhood Watch 4 Kids or share with friends and family.

2. Set ground rules for your kids online activity

Have kids use their devices in a shared room and make sure they know to get your permission before using online chat rooms or messenger apps, posting or sending photos of themselves, giving out their surname, school or phone number or meeting up with someone they've only chatted with online. Turn off location info and caller ID on their devices and show them how to use the privacy settings on their social media accounts.

3. Teach them to shout loudly when a stranger calls

If your child is home alone and a stranger knocks on the door, tell them to yell loudly, "Mum, there's someone at the door!" Most burglars will knock first, to see if anyone is home and only break in if no one answers. A good way to see if your child is ready to be home alone is to start with a short test run of around 15 to 30 minutes and slowly build up to longer periods.



Help shape our roadmap to better local infrastructure with the draft Road Management Plan



Cardinia Shire Council is seeking feedback on the draft 2025-29 Road Management Plan, which is now available for review on Creating Cardinia.

The proposed Road Management Plan (RMP) outlines the standards and level of service provided in maintaining the roads, footpaths, bridges and shared paths that are managed by Council.

The plan outlines the requirements for Council to proactively and reactively inspect, service and manage Council-managed infrastructure assets, including how often inspections will occur and how quickly Council will respond to reports.

Cardinia Shire Council Mayor Councillor Jack Kowarzik is urging the community to have their say on the draft Road Management Plan to help inform its direction and overall implementation. "Council manages an expansive road network which extends over 1600kms from the flats through our growth corridor and up into the Hills. We know that there is a lot of work to be done on our local roads and infrastructure, and we are committed to making improvements to keep the community moving."

Under the Road Management Act 2004 and Road Management Act (General) Regulations 2016, each Council must review its Road Management Plan every 4 years following a local government election. The review ensures the RMP aligns with current legal standards and community needs.

The Road Management Plan sets maximum timeframes for repairs based on the severity of the issue and the classification of the road. While works are sometimes completed earlier for efficiency or asset preservation, Council must follow the RMP's timelines to ensure consistency and legal compliance.

"We want to hear from you to understand how we can best service our local infrastructure in your interest. Your feedback will be vital to help inform the final Road Management Plan." Mayor Kowarzik said.

Community consultation is now open and will close on Tuesday 19 August 2025. Council will then review the community feedback before finalising the plan for consideration at the October 2025 Council meeting.

Community feedback invited on key strategic documents. Published: 22 July 2025

Council is inviting feedback on the draft Council Plan 2025–29 and updated Liveability Plan 2017–29 as part of the final phase of community consultation in the development of these key documents. Cardinia Shire Mayor Cr Jack Kowarzik said the Council Plan was Council's overarching strategic document that would drive Council's direction for the next four years and support Council to deliver on its commitment to the community.

"The Council Plan is our key document that will help guide our direction and decision making for this Council term, outlining how we will deliver on the long-term Community Vision, work towards our key strategic objectives, respond to challenges and leverage opportunities," Mayor Kowarzik said.

"As one of Victoria's fastest growing municipalities, it's important that we plan for our future to ensure our Shire remains a great place to live, work and play. This draft Council Plan outlines our approach to respond to the Shire's rapid growth and challenges over the coming years, and will support us to deliver on our commitment to the community."

The draft Council Plan is underpinned by five strategic objectives: Thriving communities, Vibrant places, Adaptive environments, Prosperous economies Responsible leaders

The strategic objectives have been informed by priorities identified by the Community Panel during the deliberative engagement process earlier this year. The panel reviewed and updated the Community Vision 2040 and identified a number of key focus areas that have helped to inform the strategic objectives.

A series of strategies and initiatives have been developed to achieve each of these strategic objectives, with strategic indicators to measure how they will be achieved by Council. The initiatives include tangible actions that will help Council meet community needs over the coming four years and beyond. Below are examples of initiatives under each of the strategic objectives: Develop and implement a Volunteers' Strategy to support volunteers and encourage volunteer participation. Plan and deliver accessible and inclusive recreation and community facilities. Develop a Towards Zero Emissions Plan to ensure progress towards zero emissions and carbon neutrality, and implement the plan. Conduct a comprehensive gap analysis of community and human services, education and skills, with recommendations to support advocacy and funding to attract service providers to operate in Cardinia Shire. Provide opportunities for meaningful, informed and representative community engagement to guide

National Parks need targeted feral deer control not ad-hoc hunting

Experienced park rangers and managers have described Environment Minister Steve Dimopoulos' decision to allow more recreational deer hunting in East Gippsland national parks as an attack on the very values of these precious areas.

The Victorian Protected Areas Council, a professional body of former senior park staff, is encouraging the State Government to reconsider last Friday's announcement.

"Feral deer are a serious threat to our national parks and professional and targeted control programs are needed, not unplanned recreational hunting," Victorian Protected Areas Council President Felicity Brooke said.

This decision requires amending the National Parks Act 1975 but was announced last Friday by the Minister, despite it not being permitted under the current Greater Alps National Parks Management Plan, and without any apparent consultation with stakeholders, other than deer hunters.

It is also not recommended in the State Government's Eastern Victoria Deer Control Plan 2023-2028. It is further evidence that the Victorian Government refuses to acknowledge that feral deer are a serious pest in this State, threatening the environment, agriculture and road safety.

There is no evidence that recreational hunting controls feral deer populations. The National Feral Deer Action Plan states: "Recreational hunting programs are not containing feral deer or reducing feral deer population growth and has been shown to have little impact on population growth.

The Victorian Government is putting the interests of deer hunters above those of park visitors that come to Errinundra and Snowy River national parks to connect with nature, camp in peaceful bush campgrounds, fish, swim and paddle along wild rivers and walk in majestic forests. The last thing they want is to encounter other visitors with high powered firearms, camo gear and hear gun shots. Tensions between deer hunters and other visitors already occur in parks where deer hunting is allowed.

"There is ample opportunity for deer hunting in State Forests; people need a place to go where they can feel safe and enjoy nature without firearms," Ms Brooke said.

"Feral deer control is vital, but it needs to be carefully planned, managed and timed. The Sporting Shooters Association already provides experienced hunters to support Parks Victoria's deer control programs, working with professional controllers, which the Victorian Protected Areas Council supports.

"We encourage the Victorian Government to reconsider this decision and focus on properly funded and managed feral deer control in our national parks, while considering the enjoyment of parks by visitors."



Help shape Council's next Onsite Wastewater Management Plan Published: 14 July 2025

Cardinia Shire Council is developing a new Onsite Wastewater Management Plan.

The Onsite Wastewater Management Plan helps to protect our health and environment by ensuring onsite wastewater management systems, including septic tanks, are correctly installed, managed and maintained.

To enhance the approach to wastewater management, Council is seeking community feedback to understand residents' experiences and priorities regarding wastewater management.

The Onsite Wastewater Management Plan, previously known as the Domestic Wastewater Management Plan, outlines how Council manages risks associated with wastewater from homes not connected to a municipal sewer system and: Assesses the risks to human health and the environment posed by onsite wastewater systems. This includes the risk to groundwater and surface water from existing and future systems, and the risk of existing systems that are, or could be discharging beyond the property boundaries. Identifies actions and timeframes to improve the management of these systems and minimise the risks. Manages non-compliance and what their enforcement approach is.

Wastewater includes greywater from baths, showers, sinks and kitchens, and blackwater from toilets, and encompasses residential, commercial and industrial properties that are not connected to the reticulated sewerage system commonly known as the sewerage mains. From 14 July to 4 August, Council will be engaging with residents to gather insights, ideas, and experiences that will help shape the new plan. Council wants to understand what obstacles may be present for residents who have access to the reticulated sewerage system but have not connected. During this phase of engagement, Council is specifically seeking feedback from residents currently using septic tank systems to understand more about their issues and experiences. This is an opportunity for community members to voice their thoughts on how Council manages the risks from wastewater across the shire.

This initial idea-gathering consultation will play a crucial role in shaping the draft Onsite Wastewater Management Plan, which the community will have the chance to provide feedback on in late 2025. Cardinia Shire Mayor Councillor Jack Kowarzik encourages all community members to share their feedback to help shape the new plan.

"We want to hear from our community, especially residents who currently have septic tank systems on their property. Your ideas and experiences are invaluable in helping us develop an effective and sustainable onsite wastewater management strategy," said Mayor Kowarzik. "By working together, we can create a plan that not only meets regulatory standards and protects our local environment, but also reflects the needs of our community."


Works are now underway on Cardinia Shire Council's final Sealing the Hills catchments in Beaconsfield Upper and Emerald.

Sealing works are now underway on the Stoney Creek and Old Gembrook catchments, which include Burton Road, Morris Road, and Young Street in Beaconsfield Upper and Durban Road, Old Gembrook Road and Sherriff Road in Emerald.

The works are jointly funded by the Australian Government and via Special Charge Schemes, and will include:

- pavement construction
- kerb and channel construction
- drainage improvement works
- vehicle and pedestrian crossing upgrades
- nature strip improvements
- signage

line-marking



Cardinia Shire Council Mayor Cr Jack Kowarzik is pleased to see sealing works start on these local roads, "We understand how important these sealing works are to the development of the existing townships in the Hills and improving community safety and access to community facilities and amenities."

"While there is still more to be done to improve local roads around the shire, as over 50% are currently unsealed, every road sealed or upgraded is a step in the right direction."

"Council is committed to improving our road network and we are continuing to advocate for infrastructure funding, finding alternative ways to seal local roads and building a better Cardinia for the future." Mayor Kowarzik said.

Construction is expected to be completed on the Stoney Creek catchment by October 2025, and works are expected to be completed on the Old Gembrook catchment by the end of November 2025, conditions permitting.

Lithium-ion Battery Safety Awareness



Many preventable house fires occur in Cardinia Shire every year and lithium-ion battery failure as a cause, is becoming more common. Lithium-ion batteries are a type of rechargeable battery which are available in different sizes. Most laptops, mobile phones, e-bikes, e-scooters, power banks and power tools contain them. Risks and injuries from product - Lithium-ion batteries can be highly flammable, can be very difficult to extinguish and may reignite. The ACCC saw a 92% increase in reported lithium-ion battery incidents including swelling, overheating and fires in 2022 compared to 2020. If a lithium-ion battery is not correctly manufactured, handled, stored, charged or disposed of, it can catch fire, explode or vent toxic gas. Things to look for when buying - There isn't a mandatory safety standard for lithium-ion batteries or products containing them. Ensure you buy products that contain lithium-ion batteries from a reputable supplier and always follow the manufacturer's instructions for use.
